When you make ice cream by hand, you can ensure that the ingredients you are using are fresh and natural. ACTIVITIES INFANTS (3 – 18 MONTHS)

ICE CREAM SENSORY PLAY

MATERIALS:

- · Different ice cream flavours
- · A bin/high-chair tray

DIRECTIONS:

- · Start by putting one flavour of ice cream into the bin or highchair tray.
- · Your child can explore the ice cream with their senses: taste, touch, and smell.
- \cdot $\;$ Continue by adding other flavours of ice cream, and have your child explore.

TODDLERS (19 MONTHS - 2.5 YEARS)

SCOOPING ICE CREAM

MATERIALS:

- · Ice cream
- · Spoons
- · Edible cones or small plastic cups

DIRECTIONS:

- · Prepare all materials on a tray.
- · Have your child feel the ice cream container and discuss how it feels.
- Let your child open the lid and look inside. Talk about the colour of ice cream, smell it, etc.
- Now your child can scoop some ice cream into cones or cups for you and themselves.

PRESCHOOLERS (2.5 - 5 YEARS)

ICE CREAM PARLOUR

MATERIALS:

· Big cardboard box · Markers

· Paint (optional) · Knife/scissors

· Coloured papers · Bowls

Spoons · Ice cream or cotton balls/tissue paper/cut-up paper

DIRECTIONS:

- · Cut out a big window on each side of the box.
- · Have your child decorate the box with coloured paper, makers, paint, etc.
- Make a sign for the ice cream shop.
- · Once your ice cream shop is done, go inside the box and start selling some ice cream!
- · If you do not have ice cream at home, here are some ideas to make pretend ice cream: cotton balls, crumpled up tissue paper, cut up pieces of paper for sprinkles.

JK/SK (4 - 6 YEARS)

HOMEMADE ICE CREAM IN A BAG

MATERIALS:

- · ½ cup half and half (cream or milk)
- · ¼ tsp vanilla · 1 tbsp sugar
- · 3 cups ice · 1/3 cup salt
- · Gallon size Ziploc bags
- · Quarter size Ziploc bags
- · Sprinkles, chocolate syrup, fruits (optional)

DIRECTIONS:

- Have your child measure cream/milk, vanilla and sugar, and add to a quartersized bag. Seal the bag tightly.
- · Measure and place the ice and salt in a gallon size bag.
- Place the quarter-sized bag inside the gallon-sized bag filled with ice, and shake the bags for about 5 minutes until your milk turns solid.
- · Your ice cream is done! Add sprinkles, chocolate syrup, or fruits to enjoy!

SCHOOL-AGERS (6 - 12 YEARS)

HOMEMADE POPSICLES

MATERIALS:

- · Popsicles molds (if available), or ice cube trays
- · Juice
- · Fruit available at home
- · Popsicle sticks or toothpicks

DIRECTIONS:

- \cdot $\:$ Juice or blend some of the fresh fruit. You can also use store-bought juice.
- · Cut up small pieces of the rest of the fruit you have.
- · Add fruit pieces into each popsicle mold or ice cube tray and add juice.
- Cover the Popsicle mold with the lid or add Popsicle sticks to each section of the ice cube tray, and place it in the freezer.
